'I won't be lectured by the Greens over Lady's Island lake'

Green Party claims of a lack of local political support have been met with anger by Cllr Carthy

Accusations of a lack of local political support for the campaign to save Lady's Island Lake, have irked some in Wexford, with one councillor stating: "Iwon't be lectured by the Green Party." Green Partyleader Roderic O'Gorman

visited Lady's Island Lake last week, alongside Senator Malcolm Noonan, who is a member of the Oireachtas Climate, Energy and Environment committee, to lend their voices to the campaign to save the lake.

Spokesperson for the Save Lady's Island Lake campaign, and former Green Party local election candidate, Peadar McDonald, is calling for Wexford County Council to be open about what the next steps are for the lake.

Mr McDonald said that "none of local public representatives have offered their support to the campaign yet".

This statement elicited a sharp response from Cathaoirleach of the Rosslare Municipal District Ger Carthy, who lives in Lady's Island and is the sitting Chair of the Lake Drainage Committee.

"I've been living here for over 40 years. I won't be lectured by the Green Party and wannabe councillors," said Cllr Carthy.



'I won't be lectured by the Green Party over Lady's Island'

Cllr Carthy unimpressed by Roderic O'Gorman visit to 'ecological disaster' site

Given that an "ecological disaster" has been unfolding at the beautiful Lady's Island Lake in south Wexford for some four decades now, it's probably fair that Green Party leader Roderic O'Gorman pointed out a political failure to address the issue when he arrived in Wexford last week.

However, Green Party accusations of a lack of local political support for the campaign to save Lady's Island Lake, have irked some with one councillor stating: "I won't be lectured by the Green Party."

With the survival of one of Ireland's most unique habitats hanging in the balance, the Green Party seem unmoved by assurances from Taoiseach Micheál Martin that he will personally intervene to ensure a success ful outcome.

Pollution, mostly caused by agricultural practices in the area, has meant that the unique ecosystem at the largest lagoon of its type in Ireland is seriously under threat, with experts say ing it's on the verge of "complete collapse'

Wexford County Council is set to head up a new multi-agency response to the crisis, with National Parks and Wildlife and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) also playing a part. However, it's been stated from the outset that the damage already done could take years and years to reverse, at a cost of millions.

Following on from a number of events at local level, Green Party leader Roderic O'Gorman arrived into the quaint Wexford village last week, alongside Sen-ator Malcolm Noonan, who is a member of the Oireachtas Climate, Energy and Environment committee, to lend their voices to the campaign to save the lake.

They were given a tour and saw first-hand the impacts of the pollution, as well as discussing strategies to reverse the dam age done.

Both leaders also signed a petition calling on Wexford Coun-ty Council to enforce the Water Pollution Act.

"The warning bells for Lady's Island Lake have been ringing for years, but yet the water quality in this unique habitat has continued to decline." Deputy O'Gorman said.

"Political promises of the past have not yielded any results, and I believe we now need cross-Gov-ernment action – led by the Minister for Agriculture - to reverse this destruction, restore the lagoon and properly manage the ecosystem into the future

This will mean working close ly with and supporting farmers to make positive changes, and ensuring the necessary funding is made available to support these actions".

Spokesperson for the Save La-dy's Island Lake campaign, and former Green Party local elec-tion candidate, Peadar McDonald is calling for Wexford County Council to be open about what the next steps are for the lake.

"Our group is seeking transparency around the proposed action plan from the County Council and other responsible agencies, as well as political engagement and strong support from our local representatives at council and national level," he said.

Mr McDonald also states that "none of local public represent-atives have offered their support

to the campaign yet". This last statement was some thing that irked Cathaoirleach of the Rosslare Municipal District Ger Carthy, who lives in Lady's Island and is the sitting Chair of the Lake Drainage Committee. Cllr Carthy was present in the gallery at a recent Oireachtas

Committee meeting on the crisis. "As Chair of the Rosslare Municipal District, I wasn't made aware of any visit of a member of the Oireachtas, which you'd imagine would be common cour-tesy," he said.

"Had I been approached, I could have informed them that, as Chair of the Lake Drainage Committee, I met with all of the relevant stakeholders and we're progressing on a funding appli-cation to mitigate against the issues at Lady's Island Lake. "I've been assured by the Min-

ister for Housing, James Browne, that the application will be looked upon favourably and have received personal assurances from the Taoiseach that he is taking a personal interest in this.

"The local community and the farmers are not to blame for this situation, but they're willing to contribute and support mitigation works there.

Returning to Deputy O'Gorman's visit and the allegation of a lack of support from local elected reps, Cllr Carthy bris-tled: "I don't need to support Green Party events. I have a good measure on what's going on locally here myself. I've been living here for over forty years. I won't be lectured by the Green Party and wannabe councillors What did (former Green Party leader) Eamon Ryan do about Lady's Island Lake when he was Minister for the Environment?
