

Natura 2000

Natura 2000 is a network of sites designated to protect threatened species and habitats throughout the European Union (EU). With over 27,000 participating sites, it is the

largest coordinated network of protected areas in the world, extending across all 27 EU member states, both on land and at sea (<https://bit.ly/48G2EC4>).

In 1979, the Birds Directive (as amended in 2009) established an EU-wide protection regime for all wild bird species naturally occurring in the EU. It included classification by member states of Special Protection Areas (SPAs) for 194 particularly threatened bird species and for all migratory birds.

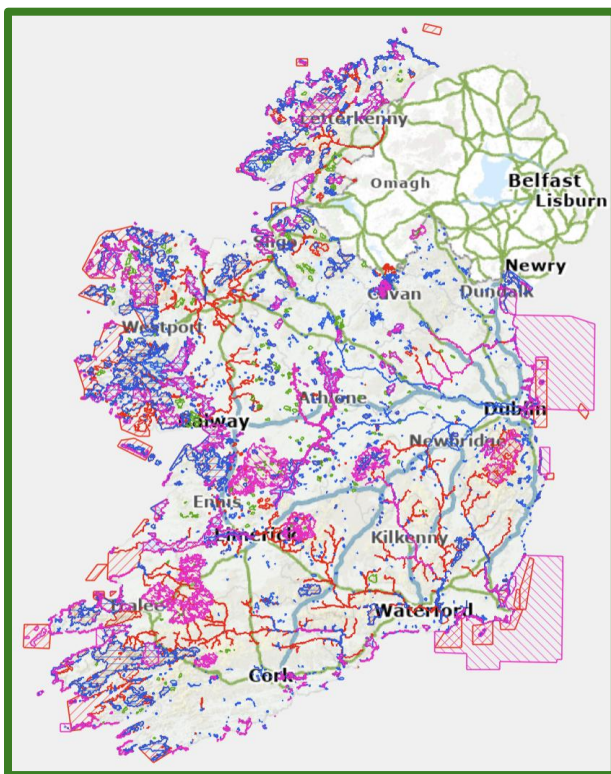
This approach was extended through the 1992 Habitats Directive, which also provided for the establishment of a representative system throughout the EU of legally protected habitats (places) and species other than birds. The protected areas are named Sites of Community Importance (SCI) and aim for the conservation of the 233 habitat types listed in Annex I of the Directive and the 900 plus species listed in Annex II. Member states identify SCIs and designate them as Special Areas of Conservation (SACs).



SPAs under the Birds Directive and SACs under the Habitats Directive together make up the Natura 2000 network. The target of both directives (specifically set out within the Habitats Directive and echoed in the Birds Directive) is to ensure the long-term sustainability of the habitats and species they have been set up to protect.

Natura 2000 sites in Ireland

The requirement under the Birds Directive and the Habitats Directive to designate Natura 2000 sites is transposed into national legislation by Part XAB, Section 177U of the *Planning and Development Act, 2000 S I No 30/2000* as amended, and Regulation 42 of the *European Communities (Birds and Natural Habitats) Regulations 2011-2021*. Natura 2000 sites are known in Irish legislation as 'European sites'.



There are 604 Natura 2000 sites in the Republic of Ireland (IE) covering an area of 19,478km² or 13.2% of the country's land area (*Natura 2000 Barometer*, No 54, August 2022).

All 604 Natura 2000 sites found in Ireland are detailed on the website of the government's National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) at <https://www.npws.ie/> with site descriptions, maps, aerial photographs, legislation, etc.

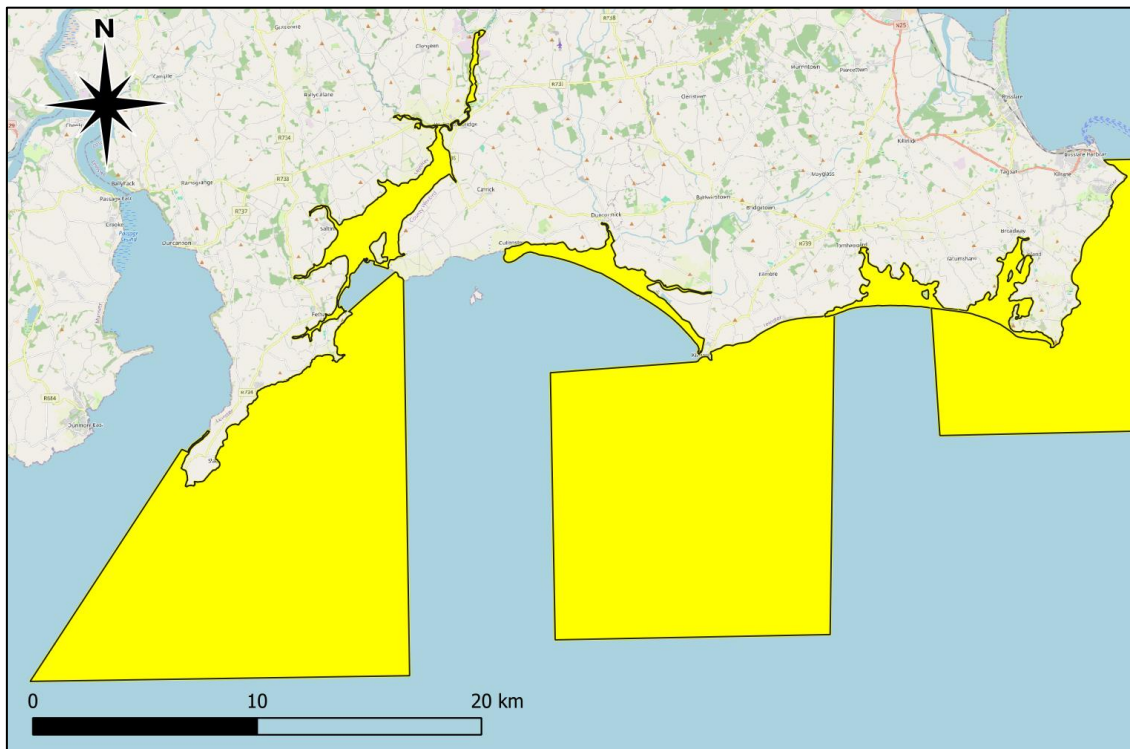


Figure 1. Special Areas of Conservation (SACs) on the South Wexford Coast (yellow fill).

There are fourteen Natura 2000 sites on the South Wexford Coast. These fourteen sites are tabulated (Table 1) and figured (Figure 1 to Figure 5) below.

Abbreviations used in Table 1

SAC = Special Area of Conservation

SPA = Special Protection Area

QIs = Number of Qualifying Interests of the site.

Hab = Number of habitats that are Qualifying Interests of the site.

Pri = Number of priority habitats that are Qualifying Interests of the site.

Spp = Number of species that are Qualifying Interests of the site.

Bird = Number of bird species that are Qualifying Interests of the site.

Mam = Number of mammal species that are Qualifying Interests of the site.



The fourteen sites on the **South Wexford Coast** comprise the following:-

- Five places with dual designation (SAC + SPA) (Bannow Bay, Ballyteige Burrow, Saltee Islands, Tacumshin Lake and Lady's Island Lake),
- Two places with SAC designation only (Hook Head and Carnsore Point),
- One place with SPA designation only (Keeragh Islands), and
- One proposed SPA (Seas off Wexford).

SWC Natura 2000 sites

Natura 2000 sites on the South Wexford Coast comprise sites of three kinds:-

1. Designated Special Areas of Conservation (SACs)

There are seven designated Special Areas of Conservation (SACs) on the South Wexford Coast (Figure 1, yellow fill).

From left (west) to right (east) the seven sites are as follows with links to their descriptions via their Site Code numbers:-

- Hook Head ([IE0000764](#))

- Ballyteige Burrow ([IE0000696](#))
- Saltee Islands ([IE0000707](#))

2. Designated Special Protection Areas (SPAs)

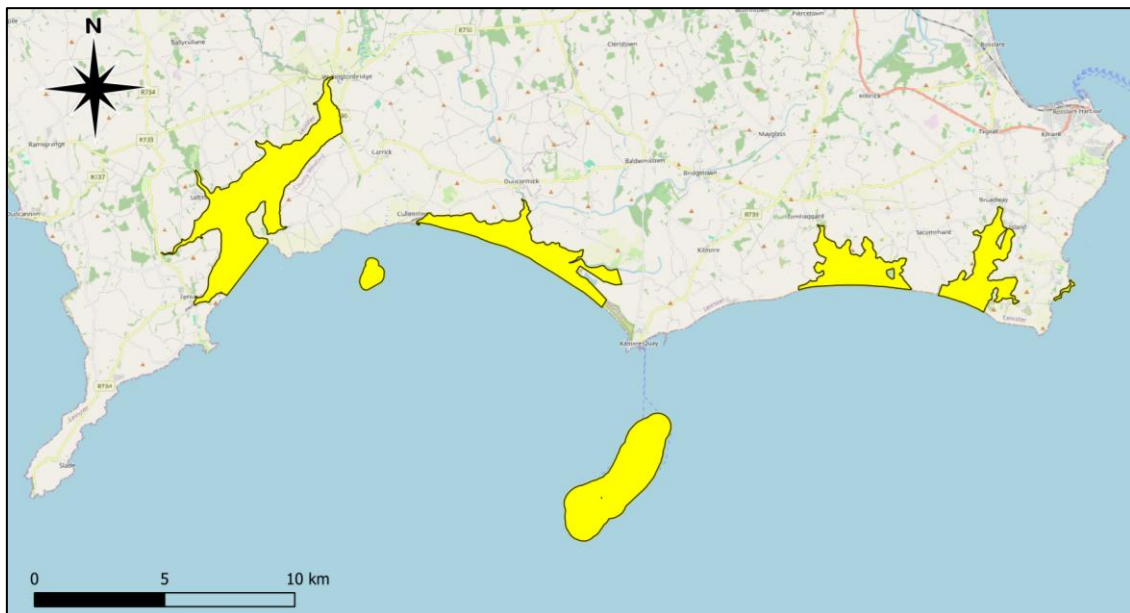


Figure 2. Special Protection Areas (SPAs) on the South Wexford Coast (yellow fill).

There are six designated Special Protection Areas (SPAs) on the South Wexford Coast (Figure 2, yellow fill).

From left (west) to right (east) the six sites are as follows with links to their descriptions via their Site Code numbers:-

- Ballyteige Burrow ([IE0004020](#))
- Saltee Islands ([IE0004002](#))

- Lady's Island Lake ([IE0004009](#))

3. Proposed Special Protection Area (SPA)

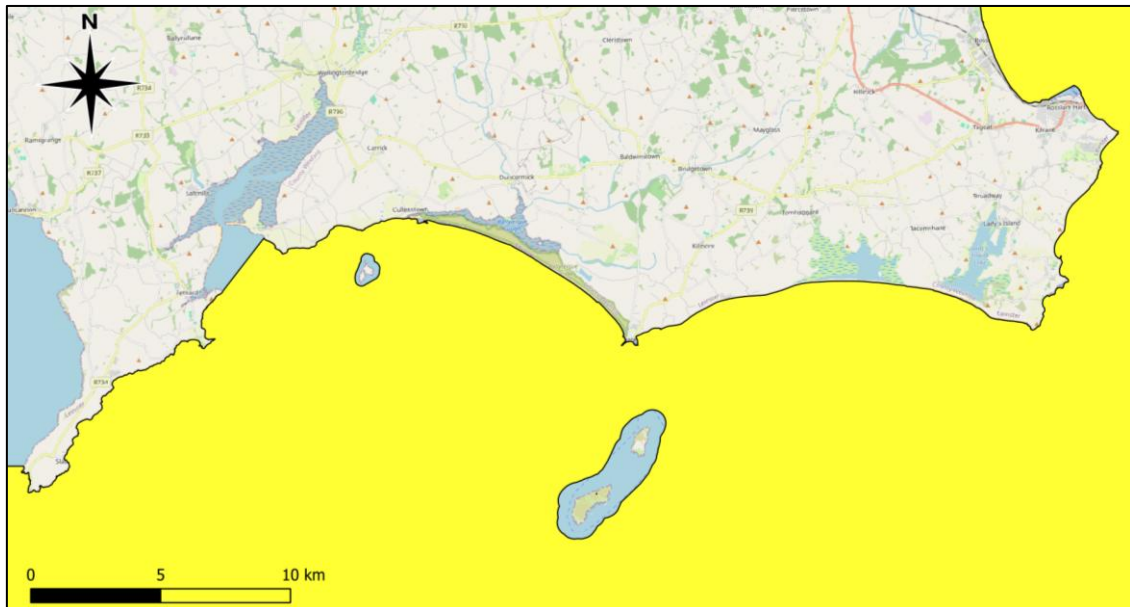


Figure 3. Proposed Special Protection Area (SPA) on the South Wexford Coast (yellow fill).

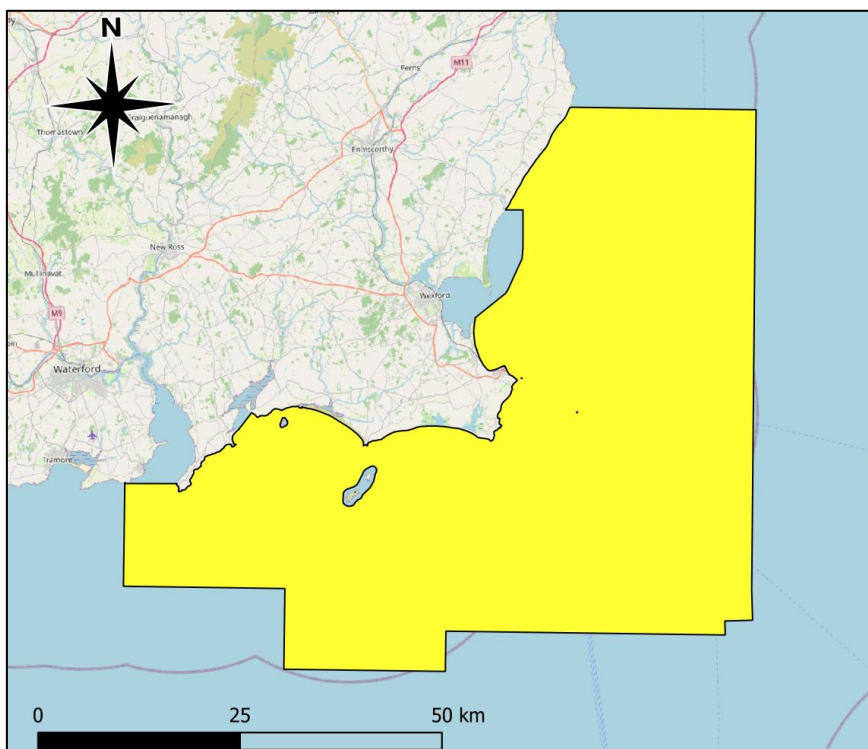


Figure 4. Proposed Seas off Wexford SPA (full extent, yellow fill).

There is one proposed Special Protection Area (SPA) on the South Wexford Coast: Seas off Wexford (Figure 3, yellow fill, South Wexford Coast only, and Figure 4, yellow fill, full extent) ([IE004237](#)). The proposed Seas off Wexford SPA is currently the largest SPA in Ireland.

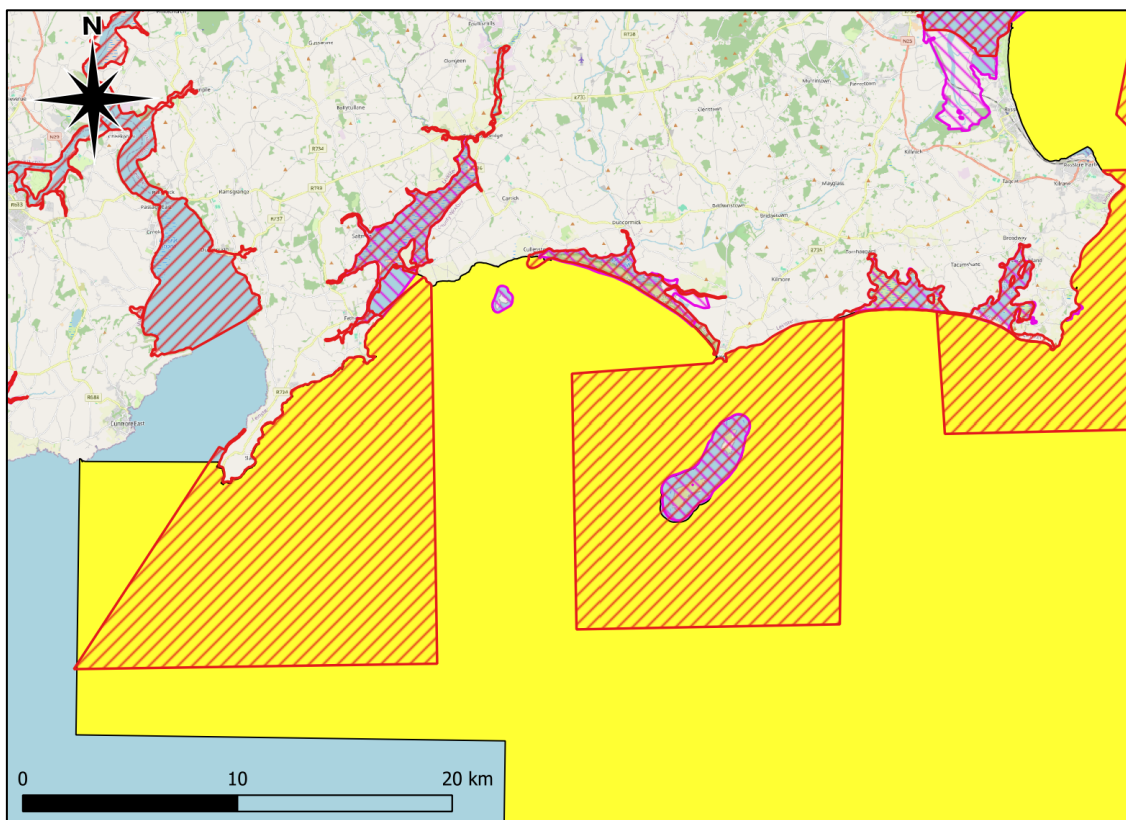


Figure 5. Natura 2000 sites on the South Wexford Coast.
